## A Role of Research Universities in the Knowledge-based Society

Venue: Sokairou Hall, National Graduate Institute for Policy Studies (GRIPS)

With the arrival of the knowledge-based society, the society's expectations for universities have increased, such that it now is anticipated that it can produce talented individuals who have wide knowledge and flexible intellectual power and can play an active role globally, reinforcing international competitiveness and securing social sustainability. On the other hand, for the solution to complicated societal problems and the creation of the new knowledge beyond the limits of the existing specialized fields, a new approach is demanded in the organizational management of universities, and it is necessary to search for new effective means. We invite Dr. John Etchemendy to the 4th Public Seminar, who exerted powerful leadership as a provost for 17 years, longer than any of his predecessors at Stanford University, and constructed the foundation of the present-day world's top-tier research university. Based on the experience of Dr. Etchemendy, who attracted outstanding researchers and made effort to encourage research activities for the solution of social issues and to develop interdisciplinary/field-integrated educational research activities during his term in office, we search for the role of a research university in the knowledge-based society and a concrete policy for industry-academia collaboration and open innovation.

## ■ John Etchemendy

(Provost Emeritus, The Patrick Suppes Family Professor of Humanities and Science, Stanford University)



John Etchemendy received his B.A. and M.A. in Philosophy from the University of Nevada, Reno, and his Ph.D. in Philosophy at Stanford University in 1982. He was on the faculty at Princeton University for two years before returning to Stanford in 1983. He is the author or co-author of seven books and numerous articles in logic, and has been co-editor of the *Journal of Symbolic Logic* and on the editorial board of several other journals. At Stanford, Professor Etchemendy has served as the director of the Center for the Study of Language and Information from 1990 to 1993, as Senior Associate Dean for the Humanities from 1993 to 1997, and as Provost from 2000 to 2017. He was Stanford's longest-serving provost, and one of the longest-serving provosts at a U.S. university.

## ■ Nagahiro Minato

(Provost, Executive Vice President, Kyoto University)



Dr. Minato graduated from Kyoto University School of Medicine in 1975 and studied as an associate researcher at Albert Einstein College of Medicine from 1977 to 1980. He received his doctorate in medicine (MD, PhD) from Kyoto University in 1981. After clinical practice at University Hospital, he was appointed to the Professor of Immunology and Cell Biology at Kyoto University Graduate School of Medicine in 1992, where he served as the Dean from 2011 to 2014. His major is immunology and he published 200 original scientific papers of the field in his career. In 2002, he invented PD-1 checkpoint blockade cancer immunotherapy with Dr. T. Honjo. He is currently Provost and Executive Vice President of Kyoto University and co-appointed as Project-leading Professor at Medical Innovation Center of Graduate School of Medicine.

## ■ Takahiro Ueyama

(Executive Member, the Council for Science, Technology and Innovation, Cabinet Office of Japan)



Completed a Ph.D. at the History Department at Stanford University after finishing the Graduate Program at the Faculty of Economics, Osaka University. He has taught at the Faculty of Economics, Sophie University (1998-2012) serving as its Dean from 2010-2012. After being Professor at the Faculty of Policy Management, Shonan Fujisawa Campus, Keio University (until 2015), and Vice President at the National Graduate Institute for Policy Studies (2015-16), he is currently Executive Member of the Council for Science, Technology and Innovation, Cabinet Office of Japanese Government. Publications include "Beyond Academic Capitalism", which was awarded the Yomiuri-Yoshino Sakuzo Prize in 2010.

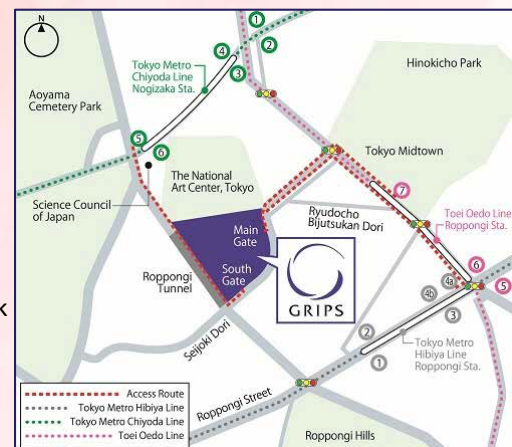
